REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING

- DON TUBB -October 23, 2000

All members of Council, except Councilor Linkson, were present for this the thirtieth session of Council. The usual staff members were present as were a normal number of people in the audience (half a dozen or so). This meeting could be characterized as clearing the decks for the new Council as several items were passed that had been worked on for months and years. But first...

At one point in the meeting, the Reeve congratulated Councillor Ashley and Deputy Reeve McEwen on being acclaimed to their respective

offices (Duncan continues as our representative and Clayton will be our new Reeve). While we're on the subject of off-the-cuff remarks... Duncan, at the end of the meeting, praised Council members, staff and, especially the Reeve in helping to get the Frontenac II assigned to us. He praised the Reeve highly - to the point that, at the end of the speech, there was general applause from everyone in the room... except for the reporters.

The Reeve responded by saying that Duncan could give his eulogy.

The Lake Ontario Waterfront Trail Working Group has requested support from Council. This would largely be limited to putting up signs and helping to figure out if the roads meet the Group's requirements for safety. One comment from the

Engineer's report to Council pricked up my ears... "For the purposes of this initial report, it is premature to give Agreement in Principle for the secondary routes on Amherst Island. The reasons for this are two-fold, however, both ultimately involve safety issues.

The majority of roadways under consideration on Amherst Island are 40' wide rights-of-way or less. Some of the roadways indicated as secondary routes are also located along shorelines which are currently under review for possible modifications. Until the longterm location of the shore roads is established, I believe it is premature to designate these routes as official routes. Generally, all routes on the Island will require extensive improvements to meet the Waterfront Trail criteria." Council approved the Engineer's recommendations which do not imply any significant monetary expenditures.

The previous mention of 'clearing the decks' referred to a couple of long standing items:

- The Official Plan was adopted. The Reeve read a short statement which had to do with the intensive agriculture problem which has caused some concerns. He said that the OP has gone as far as would be allowed by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) in controlling these enterprises.
- Council adopted a resolution to enter into an Agreement of Purchase and Sale of Bath Hydro to Hydro One Networks Inc. If the sale gets approval from the Ontario Energy Board, Loyalist Township will receive \$825,000 for Bath Hydro. Things like the office equipment and buildings used by Bath Hydro are not part of the sale. In addition Hydro One has agreed to: a 'free of charge

assist with the hanging of lights and banners for three years'; and, a one time donation of \$4000 to the Loyalist Township Canada Day Committee.

While not in the category as the above two items, Council also passed a Cemeteries By-law. This is the final version of the By-law and has been approved by the Ministry of Consumer and

Commercial Relations. This By-law covers 5 cemeteries: Glenwood and Pentland on Amherst Island; the Lutheran (Union) cemetery on Ham Road (Con 2 Pt Lt 16, 17); Bells Cemetery (4th line Con 3 Pt Lt 10); and, an abandoned family

plot at 2090 Withers Road (Con 3, Pt Lt 7).

I thought we already had a By-law to establish a Fire Department but one of these was passed, along with a Master Fire Plan.

Council also updated a Bylaw of miscellaneous fees. I think that this time the changes are for increased fees for emergency response by the Fire Department to an accident on Provincial, County or Township highways. This doesn't mean that someone needs to have \$300 in cash before the Fire Department will extract him/her from their burning vehicle... a major credit card will do (Oh! Just Kidding!!). Some other fees of interest:

- replacement of civic address signs \$60

inspection of solid fuel burning appliances \$75
 As with all of these reports, only the surface is skimmed with attention directed towards items that affect Amherst Island. Council adjourned in time for this reporter to catch the 8:30 boat which, for general interest, is about 12 minutes from the Council chamber... that's while obeying the speed limits.


MARSHALL, Captain Harold (Had) Retired Captain with U.S. Steel, Great Lakes Fleet

- Try potting up some spring bulbs for chilling outside and forcing inside; later, some indoor bulbs for winter blooms.
- Start winterization procedures for plants, hoses and garden equipment.
- Protect young trees and shrubs from rodents.
- Keep evergreens, shrubs and young trees adequately watered.

"Along the line of purple hills The crimson forest stands And all day the Blue Jay calls, Throughout the autumn lands."

I know winter is on our doorstep but you must admit that we have had one absolutely marvelous autumn. We have had those brilliant blue skies that show off the burgundy oak leaves, golden maple leaves and rich red of the sumacs to perfection. The abundance of foliage in our native deciduous trees is phenomenal, they have fought back from the ice storm of '98. the drought of '99, the on-going effects of acid rain and gypsy moth, with more growth. Are we, that man species,

not like the trees. Give us adversity and we grow stronger. Prune us a little and we grow more branches. They say that the true definition of a Canadian is one who is happiest showing he can battle a snowstorm. "No snow is going to keep me from getting to the corner store, eh!"

Well it is autumn and those Blue Jays are calling. They are much more vocal now that Fall is here. They harass the other birds at the feeder and sneak around behind us as we feed the Chickadees in the Owl Woods, harvesting the sunflower seeds that the chickadees hide. They call loudly to warn other birds of hawks or owls or man and chase the long-eared owls

mercilessly. We complain about the noise but admit it, don't you love their antics. We have one regular here that swoops in on the feeder with the cry of a Red-tailed Hawk and of course all the Mourning Doves and Sparrows scatter and then our smart friend has the feeder to himself.

I've been asked a few questions about the hawks here on the Island in autumn. The large hawk that hovers in mid-air over the fields is a Rough-legged Hawk. I describe him as a hanging banana as the body arches under those wide spreading wings. This bird comes from the arctic and sub-artic regions where it is used to the treeless tundra so here it prefers open fields and will sit in small

shrubs along the fence lines. It has feathered feet, hence the name, and comes in both light and dark phases with a patch on

> the underside of the wing which is actually the wrist although it appears as a bend in the elbow. The light phase has light coloured wings with a dark patch and the dark phase has dark and light under wings. The tail is light with a dark patch and the dark phase has dark and light under wings. The tail is light with a dark bank along the edge. In a high vole year as many as 100 have been seen here on Amherst Island and 106 on Wolfe. Our nesting Red-tailed Hawk is about the same size but its tail is solid brown or the familiar red colour as it matures. It does not have a wrist patch but has a light photo by DT belly with a bellyband where the Toughlegged has a light head and dark lower

belly. Both hawks have over a four foot wing span. The smaller Northern Harrier can be seen cruising over the fields. It has a 42" wing span and longer tail and the white rump patch is a field mark on both male and female. The female is larger and brown while the male is grey with a white belly and black wing tips. The small falcon you notice on the wires is an American Kestrel with a 21" wing span, rusty back, warm brown front and black whiskers. The male has blue wings and the female brown.

Last minute news flash! Jim Reid spotted a snowy owl. Please watch those feeders, take time to enjoy our beautiful

P.S. Here's a recipe you might want to try for winter feeding. No-Melt, All-Season Peanut **Butter Suet**

1 cup crunch peanut butter 2 cups "Ouick Cook" Oats

2 cups cornmeal

1 cup lard (no substitutions)

1 cup white flour

1/3 cup sugar

Melt lard and peanut butter. Stir in remaining ingredients. Pour mixture into suitable containers for the shape of your feeder. (I use a 9 x 9 cake pane and cut it into four to fit my wire mesh holder.) Allow to cool. Wrap and store in freezer

Lake Ontario Level







Notice Of Passing Of The Official Plan The Corporation Of Loyalist Township

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of Loyalist Township adopted the Official Plan by By-Law Number 2000-66 on the 23rd day of October, 2000, under Section 17 of the Planning Act (R.S.O. 1990, c.P.13).

PURPOSE AND EFFECT OF THE OFFICIAL PLAN

The Official Plan is a document setting out policies which are primarily intended to manage and direct the physical changes of the Township, and guide division of land, over the next twenty (20) years. Policies guide changes to land uses such as:

residential;

commercial;

industrial;

agricultural;

rural;

environmental;

infrastructure;

heritage;

group homes;

community improvements;

institutional; and

open space.

The Official Plan, as adopted by Council, was subject of:

- community consultation inclusive of seven (7) public meetings;
- a background planning study;
- agencies' input; and
- provincial review under the "one window" provincial approval process.

The Official Plan, as adopted, represents the culmination of the above consultative process.

INFORMATION AVAILABILITY

A copy of the Official Plan as enacted by Council, as well as background materials are available for inspection at Loyalist Township municipal offices during regular business hours.

APPROVAL OF OFFICIAL PLAN

The Official Plan is subject to the approval of the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing who is the approval authority. Any person or public body is entitled to receive notice of the decision of the approval authority if a written request to be notified of the decision is made to the approval authority.
