This will be a free event for all, except the students of Dry Stone Canada. There will again be a kids' workshop, using lighter materials and having fun. There will be an interactive display, helping folks learn the techniques. We'll also invite participants to wander our trails, enjoy our beach, explore our Wool Shed, feed and walk with our lambs.



Letter Regarding Museum Public Dock Thank you to Liz Harrison

Dear Ms. Ferris:

I have just visited the Stella Dock on Amherst Island (behind the museum) to see whether the missing ladder had been replaced. That is a popular swimming place, but the deep water means a ladder for climbing out is a necessity.

Imagine my surprise to discover that not only is the ladder still missing but docking a boat at the dock is forbidden while investigative measures are in place to repair the dock. The ladder has been missing since May (possibly earlier) and I assume that the dock has been deemed dangerous since that time too.

While serving at the market on a Saturday morning or being with my grandchildren while they are swimming there I have been delighted to meet all kinds of pleasure sailors who dock in in the bay. Sometimes it is their first time on the island but more often than not it is a regular venue. The loss of that facility this year will be devastating for local businesses who look forward to and plan for the presence of boaters. I have heard that a Kingston company that rents boats to tourists has removed Amherst Island from their list of recommended destinations.

This is an absolutely unforgivable situation that should never have been allowed to happen. Please oblige me with an explanation and an estimated time for completion of the repairs.

With reply as follows:

Good afternoon Liz,

I just sent the below message out to other concerned residents.....

Thank you for your questions and concerns regarding the closed dock at Stella Bay. It was brought to our attention in June that the ice over this past winter has caused significant damage to the dock which has resulted in the dock being deemed unsafe. The ladders have been removed and signage posted to ensure usage is restricted until repairs can be made.

We are in the process of discussions with specialized contractors who deal with dock repairs. We are investigating the most efficient and effective repair as we acknowledge and appreciate the impact and consequences of this dock being closed on the local small businesses on the island.

Also, please understand there are external agency

approvals (CRCA) required for this work to proceed and we are working with them to get approvals as fast as possible.

I really do understand that this is not good for all of you but please trust we are prioritizing this project to ensure it can be completed as soon as possible.

I will update you all when I have more information. Thank you for your patience.

Unfortunately, the safety concerns with the dock can also impact swimmers which is why the ladders have not been put back on and the signage is restricting boats from docking AND swimming. There are dangerous bolts sticking out just at the water level that could seriously injure swimmers. The lack of ladders was to ensure no swimming could take place.

I sincerely apologize for the timing of this – I know there could not be a worse time but please trust we are moving on this as fast as we can.
